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New Leaders Take Over Obama for President Farewell to Ed and Nat

Weingarten, Cortese and Johnson Elected To Lead AFT

Delegates to the 2008 AFT convention elected a new slate of national officers on July 13 in Chicago, voting to install Randi Weingarten as president, Antonia Cortese as secretary-treasurer and Lorretta Johnson as executive vice president. Weingarten has served 10 years as president of the 200,000-member United Federation of Teachers (UFT) in New York City, the largest union local in the United States. Cortese has served the past four years as AFT executive vice president. Johnson, president of AFT-Maryland, also serves as president of the Baltimore Teachers Union's paraprofessional chapter. "The three of us are committed to improving schools, hospitals and public institutions for children, families and communities," Weingarten said. "We will build on this union's great tradition of confronting injustice, embracing the excluded, questioning conventional wisdom, challenging the status quo—and working 24/7 to improve the institutions where our members work." Labor Gets Its First Openly Gay National Union

President-Jesse Russell reports:

New York based United Federation of Teachers President, Randi Weingarten has been elected to succeed Edward McElroy as President of the American Federation of Teachers. The election makes Weingarten the first openly gay labor leader to be president of a national labor union. Weingarten served for 10 years as UFT head, and under her tenure she negotiated a 43 percent increase in educator salaries and helped organize 28,000 home childcare workers in New York City.

In her first address as AFT president, Randi Weingarten said she will fight for a national reform agenda that protects and improves the institutions where AFT members work, while bettering the lives and prospects of those they serve—particularly those in need. "This agenda will embrace everything AFT members do—early childhood education, K-12 education, higher education and public services of all kinds." Speaking at the convention on July 14 in Chicago, Weingarten asked AFT members to rededicate themselves to strengthening their respective institutions in order to give every American the services he or she deserves. Shortly after earning the union's endorsement for president of the United States, Illinois Sen. Barack Obama asked AFT convention delegates for their help in securing a new direction in education—one that offers true opportunity for all students and steers clear of attacks on teachers masquerading as public school reform. "I want to lead a new era of mutual responsibility in education, where we all come together—parents and educators, the AFT, leaders in Washington—citizens all across America united for the sake of our children's success," Obama told delegates in a July 13 address. Moments before the Illinois Democrat made his remarks, AFT members rose to their feet, waved "Obama 2008" signs, and resoundingly approved a special order of business endorsing the senator's historic run for the White House and pledging "tireless and resolute" support in helping him secure it.
